### I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended to help incoming students become familiar with the Living Faith Bible Institute, its philosophy, methodology and student expectations. The course features weekly lectures and activities that help students better understand the technology and functionality of our online educational platform. Students will also learn and review basic skills associated with being in an academic environment.

### II. COURSE PREREQUISITES

- Students should take Freshman Orientation alongside Foundations 1 or during their first semester as a student in LFBI.

### III. MEASURABLE LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Students will be able to identify LFBI distinctives: vision, mission, philosophy and methodology.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of how myLFBI functions as a learning environment and student resource center.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of school policy, expectations, and academic integrity.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of LFBI academic standards and formatting related to assessments.
- Students will demonstrate an ability to apply best student practices.

#### IV. REQUIRED ASSIGNMENTS

- There will be weekly post-lecture quiz assignments. **(60% of grade)**
  - Each assignment will be an activity that explores that week's content. Expect that each week's assignment will take 30 min to an hour.
- The student will write a two-page research essay based on a famous missionary. **(20% of grade – due March 2<sup>nd</sup> @ 11:59 pm CST)**
  - The research paper will focus on selecting a missionary and writing a short research essay describing their life, their ministry, and how their testimony has impacted them personally. The list of missionaries to choose from will be on the assignment on myLFBI.
    - Students will learn and follow the writing process, including brainstorming, drafting, revising.
    - Students will learn and follow a simple research process.
    - Students should be encouraged to reach out to the instructor(s) for help and guidance.
- The student will write a one-page personal student vision statement. **(20% of grade – due March 11<sup>th</sup> @ 11:59 pm CST)**
  - The personal student vision statement will focus on goals in LFBI, reflection on weaknesses as a student, how their education will benefit their local church, ways in which they are hoping to lead, and how LFBI will help prepare them for specific callings on their life.
  - Students will also need to read the class textbook ***The A Game* by Kenneth J. Sufka** and discuss one thing they learned that they are going to apply as a student in LFBI to help them accomplish their goals.

## VII. COURSE GRADING POLICY

Transferring credits: we transfer students' grade-point averages based on the above scale. LFBI does not transfer letter grades. This is critical to the consideration of student honors at graduation. LFBI Instructors will calculate a percentage grade on each assignment entered in Moodle.

## VIII. ATTENDANCE POLICY

- Living Faith Bible Institute requires 100% attendance. All attendance issues will be handled directly by the course instructor within your specific class. From there, it may be deferred to the Registrar's Office. If a student misses' class but believes it may be excused, they will contact the Registrar. We believe that students have many potential extenuating circumstances that contribute to absence and for this reason, course records distinguish between excused and unexcused absence. The Registrar's Office staff is available to help students regarding any concern with attendance.
- Whether you are attending classes online or in person, it is important for students to put together a personal attendance plan. Being present and prepared for class is critical to getting the instructional experience necessary for growth. The following are the attendance requirements and policies for LFBI:
  - Students are responsible for all missed information, instruction and assignments accrued while absent from class.

- For online students, if you miss the live viewing of any class lecture, you will have **ten days** to view the class online before the corresponding quiz becomes inaccessible and you are considered absent.
- All students who miss class (i.e., sickness, missions' trips, work schedules) will be expected to stay caught up with each week's class. Instructors may, at their discretion, grant extensions to students who miss class under special circumstances.
- Students who wish to contest an unexcused absence may fill out the Absence Form on the Resource page of myLFBI for review by the Registrar's Office.
- When in live attendance, the student is expected to show common courtesy to the professor and fellow students by being punctual. Students who are regularly late to class or are a distraction to other students are susceptible to being reported to the Registrar's Office.

## IX. DROP POLICY

- Students have until the second week of semester classes to enroll for credit. The penalty for late enrollment is missing the quizzes for the sessions while they were not enrolled.
- There will be no refunds for early withdrawal beyond the second week of class or for incomplete classes.
- Students who enroll in Fall or Spring courses may be re-assigned as an "audit student" upon request prior to the end of week 4 but will not receive a refund. After week 4, all students will receive their earned grade.
- Students who enroll in Summer Self-Pace courses may be reassigned as an "audit student" upon request prior to the end of week 3 but will not receive a refund. After week 3, all students will receive their earned grade regardless of what was completed.
- Students will receive a failing grade for an incomplete course. The failing grade will go on their transcript. Contact the registrar to change enrollment status prior to the designated time.
- Students may retake a class for credit the next time it is offered by re-enrolling and paying tuition. Both grades will be recorded on the transcript.

Academic misconduct is strictly prohibited and will result in an F for the course as well as a board review of student enrollment status.
